

# ELLYSE HAS THE KNOWLEDGE AND TRAINING OF A RABBI – BUT DON'T CALL HER THAT

**E**v encountered ancient Jewish texts early in her life, but it's taken many years for her to become a recognised authority in rabbinical matters.

She recently received her ordination – or *smicha* in Hebrew – which qualifies her as the newest and second-ever Australian female Orthodox rabbi.

Except she doesn't want to be known as a rabbi, or a *rabba*, both common honorifics for Jewish women who are ordained. She's a *rabbanit* – the Hebrew word for a rabbi's wife. This may sound confusing, because the Melbourne lawyer has become an ordained religious leader, not the wife of one. But *Rabbanit Borghi* chose this title out of respect for rabbis' wives and says she "really identifies with the work that they do".

"I feel really connected to these women who exist today," she explains. "I appreciate that I've come to have a leadership role in a different way. "I'm not married to a rabbi. But the work that I do is essentially the same."

Rabbis' wives are traditionally leaders in their own right – teaching brides, engaging in community support work and hosting their own ritual events or classes. A *rabbanit's* work was historically unpaid. Her husband, the rabbi, was the one who received a salary. Despite this, the role has been valued and celebrated in Orthodox Jewish communities around the world.

## Wives who married what they wanted to be

Shuly Rubin Schwartz, a professor of Jewish history, describes the role of *rabbanit* – also known by its Yiddish title, *rebbetzin* – as derivative. "You only get to have [the role] if you're married to a rabbi," she says, "and the prestige of the role, in many ways, parallels that of the rabbi." Dr Schwartz knows a thing or two about rabbis and their wives – her father was a rabbi, her son is a rabbi, and she was married to a rabbi for 24 years.

Throughout history, she says, the *rebbetzin's* role was a unique opportunity for women to have a career in Jewish leadership – although it was one that existed within marriage.

"For most of the 20th century, the idea of marriage and career were seen as incompatible," she says. "The closest way you could get to what you wanted was to marry what you wanted to be."

*Rebbetzins* educated the community – what Dr Schwartz describes as their "built-in audience" – by leading text-based learning, preparing brides-to-be and ministering to sick congregants. Dr Schwartz wrote a book about these women, who, like her mother, served their communities tirelessly in the post-war period in America.

"They were under-appreciated, and certainly not ever written about or recognised in any of the histories that I read," she says.

Dr Schwartz says she is moved by *Rabbanit Borghi's* decision to use the title "as a way of honouring those female leaders on whose shoulders she stands".

"Since she earned her title in her own right," she says, "the title fails to do justice to the ground-breaking nature of her role as an ordained female rabbinic leader." Asked whether she ever wanted to be a rabbi herself, Dr Schwartz says, "the thought never really crossed my mind". Her love of Jewish history has always been her primary focus.

"I was also already married to someone who was sitting for the *rabbanate*," she says. "I certainly felt that one rabbi in the family was enough."

Women are not recognised as rabbis by the Rabbinic Council of Victoria, where *Rabbanit Borghi* practices. Rabbi Moshe Gutnick, the president of the Rabbinic Council of Australia and New Zealand, estimates there are 100 practising Orthodox rabbis in the country – all men.

"While Jewish tradition does not allow for the formal ordination of women, it does not preclude women who choose to excel in the study of *Halacha* (Jewish law)," he says. He says many of these learned Jewish women act as *Halachic* teachers, and "these women are to be encouraged and applauded".

The Progressive Jewish movement has seven female rabbis, out of a total 14 practising rabbis in Australia, according to Jocelyn Robuck, the executive officer of the Union for Progressive Judaism.

*Rabbanit Borghi* graduated from the world's first Orthodox co-educational rabbinical program, at the Har'el institute in Israel.

Committed to her Orthodox faith, she decided on the rabbinical path because of "a deep confidence in myself, and a knowledge of my capacities and capabilities – that they would be equal to a man".

She sees deep relevance in ancient texts – especially in the fallibility and redemption of biblical characters.

"Having these ancient stories about what human beings are like, and what a great human being can be – while still making mistakes – is a real source of strength for me, a real source of comfort," she says.

For *Rabbanit Borghi*, the joy of ordination comes with a sense of duty.

The Jewish community requires more than "teachings about the Torah," she says. "They require comfort during times of loss. They require rituals to celebrate life milestones.

"And to be a caretaker of those times of grace and times of joy, is an enormous responsibility that I feel quite awed to have." ✨



# FLY ALREADY

Etgar Keret

**A brilliant new collection of stories from Etgar Keret, a master of the genre.**

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# THE BEST JEWISH SIGHTS AND WAR MEMORIALS IN BUDAPEST

It's one of the world's saddest sights – a jumble of shoes scattered along the Danube riverfront in Hungary's capital Budapest. They come in all shapes and sizes, from workers' boots to smart businessmen's shoes, from dainty court high heels to a pair of children's tiny lace-ups, today filled with a tangle of bright yellow buttercups.

These 60 pairs of cast-iron shoes are the powerful memorial to one of the most despicable events of World War II, when members of the Hungarian Nazi Arrow Cross Party ordered a group of their Jewish countrymen to take off their shoes before shooting them dead, leaving their bodies to crumple into the river.

But while it's heart-rending to ponder the fate of the more than 100,000 Hungarian Jews in Budapest who perished in the Holocaust – more than half of the Jewish population of the city – via the many remarkable memorials that dot the city, it can still be an incredibly inspiring experience. No one who sees those shoes will ever forget the horror of what happened, but they'll also never doubt Hungarians' determination to bare their hearts and souls to the world, in the hope of it never happening again.

For there are also so many stories of individual heroism during such a dark time in history that are celebrated in one of Europe's most stunning cities, and which can make a visit an →



Swedish passports, and sheltering them in safe houses. He once stopped a train on its way to Auschwitz to hand out passports, under Nazi fire, through the windows.

“People were supposed to have some kind of connection to Sweden, however tenuous,” says Budapest toursbylocals guide Petra Csanyi of the man who’s now an honorary Australian citizen and who has become the subject of several international movies. “But anything would do. One man said his uncle had visited Sweden and brought him a teddy bear home. That was enough!”

*In the Raoul Wallenberg Memorial Park is another absolutely awe-inspiring memorial. This is the Emanuel Tree, a weeping willow sculpture with the names of 30,000 Holocaust victims inscribed on the metal leaves. It was commissioned by Hollywood film star Tony Curtis whose father, Emanuel Schwarz, was a Hungarian Jew.*

But among all the memorials, statues and parks in the names of those who perished, or those who tried to save them, there are other amazing Jewish sights in Budapest. There are the three major synagogues, for instance, including the second-largest synagogue in the world outside New York, the magnificent yellow-and-red-striped Grand Synagogue built in 1859, with both Romantic and Moorish architecture and, unusually, an organ. Hungarian composer and pianist Franz Liszt himself played at its opening ceremony.

But despite its grandeur, locals still don’t mind poking fun at themselves. On the synagogue steps are souvenir sellers, peddling T-shirts. One has a basketball player emblazoned on the front with a variation on the Nike slogan, Just Jew It, with the name Michael Jewdan instead of Jordan. Another favourite is a picture of Moses, holding a stone inscribed with the 10 commandments, with a caption that he was the first to download wisdom on his tablet.

After all, the old Jewish quarter of the town, once so deserted, is now one of the hippest bohemian areas of the city, full of smart cafes, restaurants, boutiques, street art and bars.

Yet poignancy is never far away from the smiles. Next door to the synagogue is the Hungarian Jewish Museum with a huge array of precious objects, both ceremonial and day-to-day.

Among them is a home-made menorah, or traditional lampstand, made by a poor resident out of bent spoons and napkin holders. Another is fashioned from breadcrumbs, by a destitute family keener to honour their religion than assuage their own hunger. ✡

→ incredibly enriching experience. There’s the beautiful memorial to Carl Lutz, the Swiss vice-consul who saved an estimated 60,000 Hungarian Jews, by issuing them with documents to allow them to emigrate and hiding others in protected houses for which he claimed diplomatic immunity. His selfless actions are remembered with a bronze sculpture showing an angel reaching down to help someone lying helpless on the ground, with the inscription, “Whoever saves a life is considered to have saved an entire world”.

Swedish diplomat Raoul Wallenberg was another hero who’s immortalised in a bronze statue, this time enclosed between two rock walls. He saved about 20,000 Jews by issuing

In science, you were at the forefront of your field, amongst only a mere few that possessed the knowledge and capacity to drive your area of environmental chemistry forward. Your contributions to environmental chemistry, among others, helped those in the field understand whether popular anti-flame chemicals can lead to the formation of one of the most toxic compounds known to humans. Your colleagues stated that you had visionary ideas that could possibly form a whole new field of analytical chemistry.

During the 2019 British Mass Spectrometry Conference that explored Environmental and Food analysis, you were asked to present as a key note speaker. This conference is incredibly prestigious and is usually reserved for professors whom have worked in the field for more than 30 years. During this event, you were granted the 'Emerging Future Leader' award recognising your contributions to the field of analytical chemistry. In layman's terms, your colleagues stated that this award meant that you are going to be leading the field of chemistry for years to come.

Leon, the way you reacted to this award, shows us your humbleness and pure passion for the science, not for your personal fame or ego. Leon being as humble as he was, didn't even acknowledge this as an achievement, and subsequently, did not tell of this award to those closest to him. As your colleagues remember, you were always enthusiastic and willing to help others in the field, not for money or your name on a paper, but just because you loved science and wanted to share it.

You always challenged yourself and other people on the scientific findings that arose from your chemical experiments. You were very precise and self critical in your work, full of creative ideas- qualities a lot of other scientists need but do not always possess.

Just as you lived your life, you pushed the boundaries, always going beyond current limitations determined to pursue your dreams.

You were unique as a son, brother, partner, scientist and friend. You gave of yourself so willingly and showed endless generosity to those that were privileged to be in your heart. Your zest for life was evident in your extensive travels and pursuit of pleasure. Examples of your passions included motor bikes, kite surfing, deep sea diving, body boarding, shooting and squash. You truly were a citizen of the world, personally creating opportunities to live, work and study in many countries and continents. These included Israel, America, France, Australia, Germany, England and finally, the Czech Republic. It is here that you found your second home in Prague, the country that housed 2 out of 3 of your greatest loves in life; Marketa and beer.

You were able to talk to people from all walks of life. Why? Because you spoke always from your heart. You externalised, and mum was your confidante. You shared every crevice of your heart with our mother, which mum knows is a blessing straight from Hashem. She felt privileged to be your mother. She knew of your friendships, your trials and tribulations, your highs and lows. She held your hand and was your passenger on every highway, every moment of your life. Thank you for allowing her to walk your path with you.

### ***Remembrance Day, 11 November:***

Originally called Armistice Day, this day commemorated the end of the hostilities for the Great War (World War I), the signing of the armistice, which occurred on 11 November 1918 (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month).

Armistice Day was observed by the Allies as a way of remembering those who died, especially soldiers with 'no known grave'.

After the end of World War II in 1945, the Australian and British Governments changed the name to Remembrance Day as an appropriate title for a day which would commemorate all war dead. In October 1997, then Governor-General of Australia, Sir William Deane, issued a proclamation declaring:

*"11 November as Remembrance Day and urging Australians to observe one minute's silence at 11.00 am on Remembrance Day each year to remember the sacrifice of those who died or otherwise suffered in Australia's cause in wars and war-like conflicts."*







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## Ask the Rabbi : HOW TO TREAT A CONVERT?

### Q. How should we treat a convert – to Judaism, and away from Judaism?

**A.** The convert to Judaism must be treated with respect and love. This rule is supported by the verse, “You shall love the stranger (‘ger’), for you were strangers in the land of Egypt” (Deut.10:19).

The word “ger” in this verse was originally meant to refer to an outsider, an alien, who lives in our midst, but by a logical extension it has come to mean a convert too.

Whatever their original background, they have come – sometimes by means of a long and lonely path – to be one of us and have left behind much that they were accustomed to. They must be treated properly and, as the Mishnah Bava Metz’ia reminds us, must not be reminded of where they came from.

Maimonides records that a certain convert called Ovadiah was insulted by his Jewish teacher; Maimonides indignantly asks, “Was the teacher drunk?”

A procession of authorities state that a convert can refer to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob as “our fathers” (Mishnah Bikk. 1:4), since Abraham was the “father of converts” and brought them “under the wings of the Divine Presence” (Ruth 2:12).

The Shulchan Aruch says that some people were reluctant to let a convert conduct a service, but this opinion is rejected (Orach Chayyim 51:19).

The great Talmudic sage Resh Lakish tells us that the convert “is even more precious than Israel when they stood at Mount Sinai. Had they not seen the thunder and lightning, the mountain quaking and the shofar being sounded, they might not have accepted the Torah, but a convert, who has seen none of these things willingly comes forward to God and accepts upon himself the Kingdom of Heaven” (Tanchuma, Lech L’cha 6d).

There is a theory that the souls of all later converts were potentially there at Mount Sinai and when they subsequently find their way to Judaism they are renewing an ancient spark of identity that was awaiting its moment.

The rabbis say, “The Holy One waits for the nations to come under His wings” (Num.R. 10:1); the prophets say that in time to come the whole world will come streaming to the Mountain of the Lord (Isa. 2:3).

I know that there are cynical views (Yev. 47b etc.) that converts are as troublesome to Israel as boils, but this may reflect a difficult time in ancient Jewish history – or perhaps it can be taken as a compliment to converts, in that their enthusiasm for Judaism often puts born Jews to shame.

How about converts from Judaism?

Colloquially they are called “m’shummadim”, from a root that means to destroy, because they have a negative attitude to Judaism, deleteriously affect the Jewish people, and can end up being more mixed up than ever before. In Jewish history some of our worst opponents were former Jews, and their wiles and ways often brought great suffering to our people. Yet Heine made the cynical remark that sometimes an apostate only needs to smell a cholent to feel a Jewish spark.

There are some people who, aghast at a child abandoning Judaism, have sat shivah for them, though it is possible that the origin of this idea is the halachic question of whether, when an apostate dies, the family is obliged to carry out the rituals of mourning including sitting shivah.

However difficult it is, one should probably not sever all ties with the renegade Jew but hope that they will one day find their way back. In my own rabbinic experience I have met a number of people whose ancestors left Judaism and they now wish to reclaim it.
