AUSTRALIA'S PEAK NATIONAL JEWISH BODY IS CALLING FOR ACTION TO TACKLE AN "ALARMING" RISE IN ANTISEMITIC INCIDENTS.

KEY POINTS:

- The Executive Council of Australian Jewry has released its annual report on antisemitism in Australia.
- The ECAJ and associated organisations logged 478 antisemitic incidents over a 12-month period.
- There was a 41.9 per cent increase in antisemitic incidents in Australia over the past two years.

A group of Orthodox Jewish men were verbally abused and physically assaulted in Melbourne in February last year, with their religious skullcaps forcibly removed.

A woman punched, kicked and bit a Jewish man in May after she saw his Star of David necklace.

In June, a Jewish man in Bondi in Sydney's east was approached by a man and woman, who told him he "did not belong in the area" and was "destroying the heritage", before taking his hat from his head and throwing it on the ground.

And these are not the only violent acts of antisemitism reported in Australia over the last year, with a new report indicating they are just the tip of the iceberg. Antisemitism on the rise in Australia There were 478 antisemitic incidents logged between 1 October 2021 and 30 September 2022, according to the Executive Council of Australian Jewry's (ECAJ) annual report on Antisemitism in Australia released on Friday.

The ECAJ says this is an increase of almost 42 per cent over the past two years.

The report uses the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance working definition of antisemitism, which describes it as a "certain perception of Jews, which may be expressed as hatred toward Jews. Rhetorical and physical manifestations of antisemitism are directed toward Jewish or non-Jewish individuals and/or their property, toward Jewish community institutions and religious facilities."

The incidents detailed in the report include physical assault, vandalism, verbal abuse, harassment and intimidation, hate messages, graffiti, and propaganda material such as banners, flags, leaflets, posters, and stickers.

Peter Wertheim, co-chair of the ECAJ, described the findings as concerning.

"The statistics are quite alarming," he told ABC News.

"It's not the sort of thing we expect in a country like Australia, where we're accustomed to think of as a peaceful and cohesive society."

The report also detailed discourse and action within mainstream politics, media, society, education and COVID-19 antisemitism.

It said antisemitism had been either validated or not rejected in each of these sectors, including Nazi analogies by politicians, Facebook comments on news articles, display and promotion of Nazi memorabilia, and bullying or stereotyping of Jewish students in schools.

Mr Wertheim said education has a pivotal role to play in combating antisemitism and keeping the lessons of the Holocaust alive, with a recent report showing a decline in levels of awareness of the event that saw the genocide of millions of European Jews during World War Two.

"The level of historical knowledge and particularly knowledge of the Holocaust is diminishing," he said.

"It really does underline the importance of museums and school education and university education and so on."

Mr Wertheim said a "whole of government" approach was needed to address antisemitism. "There has been work done in this area and it's positive and a good start but it's clearly not enough. It really isn't attacking it in a systematic way," he said.

"We have different branches of government doing different things, but there doesn't seem to be a whole of government approach to dealing with systemic racism and more importantly with specific forms of racism like antisemitism."

The report was released to coincide with International Holocaust Remembrance Day.

"Antisemitism is on the rise but it will not find a home here," Prime Minister Anthony Albanese said in a video posted to Twitter.

"Australia will always denounce it and reject it utterly, just as we do all forms of racism and prejudice. We owe it to our country, we owe it to our Jewish community, and we owe it to our survivors.

"They deserve nothing less."

What is the price of a life? The prosecution of aged Nazi criminals raises unexpected ethical questions

" Germany has no statute of limitations for murder, he says — though only since 1979, and only after a remarkable amount of pressure, primarily to ensure that Nazi killers do not feel they can get away with their crimes. Even now, Will is handing over to local prosecutors five cases that he believes "still have a chance of going to trial". Why the insistence on pressing ahead with such cases as long as the perpetrators are alive? Although ostensibly about punishing the wicked, this is rather for what may be termed social and educational reasons: not allowing Holocaust denial to gain a stronger foothold in society — especially, if amazingly, in Germany. It is about teaching the young — as well as the notso-young — about the Holocaust and the evils of racial persecution and genocide.

It will take a long time, especially given the glacial pace at which German justice traditionally moves in these cases, for the accused even to be declared fit to stand trial. Then, if they are convicted - which, with all the resources and evidence on hand when their trials occur, is still far from certain — any punishment they receive will be minimal, taking into account their ages and health more than the gravity of the crimes themselves. And beyond all that, when they committed their crimes, they were in legal terms "juveniles", and are now so old that they may hardly be able to comprehend, much less suffer from, any punishment they receive.

In what is probably the most recent case, and certainly one of the last, Irmgard Furchner, a 97-year-old woman in a wheelchair wearing a cream-coloured winter coat and beret (though why, I wonder, should we care about what a Nazi criminal wears?), was convicted of aiding and abetting the murder of 10,505 people and attempting the murder of five. She worked as a secretary in a concentration camp. Her punishment for preparing the paperwork for the transport of these people to their deaths was a two-year suspended sentence.

The punishments meted out are meaningless. No one needs a calculator to work out the value, in terms of penalty, of a life lost to these criminals. Furchner's 10,505 lives were worth two years, suspended. Two years is 730 days, or almost exactly one hour and forty minutes per life, suspended. And of course, because she is now 97, she is unlikely to survive for the two years of her sentence. The obscene inconsequentiality of such punishments needs no comment.

Their ages mean that these criminals were born in around 1927. Those born after that would not have been old enough by 1945 to be criminally liable as adults — scarcely even as juveniles - for their actions. Those born before that date are far too old and infirm even to stand trial today. Any surviving war criminal must be well into his (or, as not only German men were war criminals, her) nineties, aged now 95 and up. And although Furchner and others were certainly part of the Nazi killing machine, the real killers — as distinct from secretaries typing out orders to dispatch their fellow-humans to the gas chambers - are all dead or have got away scot-free.

Statistics on the extremely aged are not easy to come by. About 7.3 per cent of Germany's population of 86 million is over 80 years old. That is some 5.6 million men and women, which sounds like a lot. But the over-90s come to only some 981,000. Germans aged over 100 are far fewer. at a mere 20,000. Death comes faster and faster at those ages. The old die. That's what they do. Therefore, those 95 and up - which is to say, those born in 1927 or earlier, those old enough to have been killers cannot be very many.

As I said, Thomas Will's office is sending those five cases to court. Why bother? Punishments at the levels we see are not the point. Indeed, they are so trifling that in themselves they constitute an argument against even trying the culprits. Education, obviously, is the point. Now that task is aided by International Holocaust Remembrance Day, with annual ceremonies all over the world, both in culprit countries and in those that helped to defeat the Germans, alongside lectures and teaching about the Holocaust in schools and colleges — all this is further supported by the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, D.C. and Yad Vashem in Jerusalem, together with other museums and monuments and institutions in a great variety of countries.

Yet Western countries, in particular, are still finding it necessary, almost eighty vears after the liberation of Auschwitz. to labour to root out the poison of anti-Semitism and Holocaust denial from politics and society. France and the UK, together with the United States home to the largest community of Jews outside Israel — as well as Russia, all of them countries that took the lead in the fight against wartime Germany, are home to frighteningly large and open anti-Semitic movements. impervious to the lessons taught by those who laid down their lives in the generations of their own parents and grandparents.

Education, teaching the lessons of the Holocaust, may be missing the point. Murdering one person can get you as much as twenty years imprisonment. But murdering 10,505 — Jews, or Roma, or homosexuals, or any others of those the Germans deemed subhuman — and then evading capture for eighty years gets you just that slap on the wrist of a 97-year-old woman in a wheelchair, wearing that cream-coloured winter coat. Surely a human life is worth more than an hour and forty minutes, suspended.

Innocent worshippers were shot outside a synagogue. Children were mowed down intentionally at a bus stop in Jerusalem. Seven people were shot in Monterey. Nineteen people were killed in storms in California. A hundred dead in mudslides in Peru. Over 40.000 and rising innocent humans were killed in Turkey and Syria by the earthquake and thousands more are left starving, freezing, and shelterless. Where was God in all this?

Not to mention all those horrible things that human beings have always done to each other all over the world. I am still traumatized by the very idea of the Holocaust and that anyone could take so many babies and blow their brains out or smash them against walls in cold blood the way so many Europeans did not so long ago. It could easily have been me. Hundreds of thousands of Rohingya are abandoned and neglected and no one seems to care. Money is squandered on arms and terrorism instead of humanitarianism. An evil man like Vladimir Putin thinks nothing of sending torrents of missiles upon innocent civilians simply because he wants something the victims do not. All the daily crises around the world with millions suffering.

If you are a rationalist, you will say that the natural world functions according to its own rules. Volcanos and earthquakes are simply the physical movements of the earth's crust. They don't intend to kill anyone. But if we are in the way we will get hurt. Floods have always happened. Avalanches engulf skiers, and we catch diseases, and we die. If we don't look where we are going, we may get run over, or if we go to a crowded rock concert, we may catch Covid.

If disasters, whether man-made or natural, are punishments from God then what did children in the Holocaust or Rwanda or Aceh do to deserve it? If God does control the world, then punish the baddies or protect the good. Is all this God's fault if as the Talmud says not a blade of grass moves on this earth unless God wills it?

The problem comes when you have to deal with Torah texts that appear to get God to conform to human standards, such as Abraham saying, 'Won't the Judge of all humanity be humane?' Or Moses saying "God is just and forgiving" or indeed God Himself saying He rewards the good and punishes the bad? One answer the rabbis gave was simply 'Not in this world.' You can take it or leave it. The whole point of God is as something not human that does not conform to our limited minds.

How often are we told that if we suffer it is because we must have done something to deserve it? Or that God works in mysterious ways? Or that we all have predestined life spans and if a child dies it is because it fulfilled some important role and who knows whether a short good might not be better than a long and bad one? Attempts to explain often fall flat. Even Hillel and Shammai concluded that life is so tough it would have been better not to have been born!

Yet when bad things happen people often ask why did this happen to me? Me? Not him or Her? But they don't ask why they have been so fortunate to have had a roof over their head, food on their table, a car to drive, and fine vacations. A spot on our nose hurts more than someone else's broken leg. What people want and need is comfort. Love and concern. These are emotional responses, not rational ones. There is a very different way of looking at this. The mystical tradition sees things in a non-rational way and finds comfort in other ways. Just as some people are brighter than others or more emotional or spiritual, so in religious matters, some find comfort in simple faith and some in pseudo-rational explanations, and some in hocus pocus. The placebo effect is very powerful and often helpful. But it is not rational.

The role of God for the mystic is not to solve our problems, a cookie store, a slot machine, or Superman. A mystical or non-rational dimension compares God to love. It is an experience that gives strength and emotional support. I don't turn to God to solve my problems or answer why. I simply experience loving energy that is, rather than does. I accept forces beyond my control and focus on what I can affect. Some mystics claimed that you need to fight God. argue, and accuse and the very anger is at least a connection, an engagement. There is the famous myth of the rabbis in Auschwitz convening a court to try God and found Him guilty, but then got up to pray. God can be a kind of emotional punching bag. As well as comfort even in the darkest hour.

When someone is in pain and asks 'Why?' they don't necessarily want a rational answer. They want to be comforted and not necessarily with words.

My favorite opinion in the Mishna (Pirkei Avot 4:19) is that of Rabbi Yannai who said, "We can't explain why good people suffer and bad people flourish." At least he doesn't try to palm us off with answers that do not satisfy. I am suspicious of those who claim to know how God works. But I do think providing comfort is crucial. One can love someone madly and yet not understand them completely. The love remains despite the disappointment.

The Torah keeps on repeating the need for love and respect. Rules and warnings help with the disciplines and structures we need in life. But it is passion and love and helping others that can help us cope. Emotional intelligence matters just as much as intellectual. God falls within those parameters rather than philosophy (with apologies to Maimonides). Most of us just seek comfort. A hug rather than a sermon.

I have just read a book by an important rabbi and philosopher Sam Lebens "A Guide for the Jewish Undecided: A Philosopher Makes the Case for Orthodox Judaism." I expected better. He uses a variation of Pascal's wager to persuade us to consider believing in God. Blaise Pascal was a seventeenth-century French theologian and mathematician who argued that a rational person should believe in God. Because if God does not exist, such a person will not lose very much. Whereas if God does exist, he stands to receive infinite gains in the next world and avoid hell. So, if it's a fifty-fifty chance of God existing why not go for it? What have you got to lose? Sounds like a commercial. And even if vou are willing to act on speculation, this still does not tell me that God exists or how God thinks or works.

Much as I love philosophy, when it comes to God it is a very weak tool. I don't turn to God to solve my problems or answer why. I turn to God to feel things I might not otherwise and experience something that is, rather than something that does what I think it ought to.

Ghosts

Q. Does Judaism believe in ghosts?

A. Despite suggestions to the contrary, the answer is <u>NO</u>.

This applies regardless of whether the living try to summon up the ghost or whether the ghost appears on its own initiative.

The Jewish belief as summed up by Maimonides (Guide 3:46) is that when you die, your body is buried and your soul returns to God - however, Nachmanides is more inclined to think that in the afterlife, people have both bodies and souls.

In Maimonides' view, your soul is immortal but as it no longer has a body, it can only "appear" in a spiritual or metaphorical way.

Joseph was unable to sin once he saw the "d'mut d'yukno shel aviv", "the appearance of his father" (Rashi on Gen. 39:11, based on Sotah 36b).

The thought of his father Jacob came into his mind and steeled his conscience. His father had taught him morality and courage, and as his father's son he could strengthen himself against sin.

Many people ask themselves, "What would my father or mother think

(or say)?" and have a strong feeling of how the parent would handle a specific situation.

In folklore there are references to spirits and demons, but the rationalist tradition deny that they have any authentic physical shape, form or presence.

The Torah forbids enquiring to or of the dead (Deut, 18:11), though some say that communicating with the dead is not impossible though it is forbidden.

Maimonides regards such communication as witchcraft and pagan.

It is true that the Bible reports contacts with the dead, e.g. King Saul using the Witch of En-Dor to summon the deceased judge Samuel (I Sam. 28), but whilst Hai Ga'on thought this was a oneof-a-kind miracle, Shmuel ben Chofni Ga'on said the witch was an imposter who fooled Saul.

Roaming ghosts figure in many traditions, but the stories are generally dismissed as imagination.

Even Australia has Jewish ghost stories such as Abraham Davis of Broome, who (as a tall bearded figure wearing a tallit) haunted his former house when it became the home of an Anglican bishop.

After 1980 when the house was demolished there were no further sightings of the ghost.
