These were the instructions given to the leadership of Soroka in the 1950's. This year, on Israel's 75th anniversary, JNF Australia is partnering with Soroka Medical Centre to revitalise the grounds of this centre and transform the landscape and outdoor spaces into the beautiful healing oasis that Ben-Gurion envisioned.

Established in 1959, Soroka was a single building, housing only vital medical services for the residents of Be'er Sheva, then a small but growing community. Soroka is now the largest hospital in southern Israel and the primary medical centre for the 1.2 million residents (including 400,000 children) of the Negev. It is a strategic asset of the State of Israel and plays a crucial role as THE frontline hospital of the South, treating soldiers and victims of terror.

The new Queensland Holocaust Museum,

the state's first museum to be dedicated to the Shoah officially opened In July 2023, honouring more than 200 Holocaust survivors who made Queensland their home.

The museum was opened by Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk, Minister for Multicultural Affairs Leanne Linard and Councillor for Central Ward, Vicki Howard.

"Antisemitism is evil. Pure and simple. It's not just a horror of the past – it's still among us today," Palaszczuk said.

"That's why we are opening Queensland's first Holocaust Museum and Education Centre."

Visitors to the museum will hear first-hand filmed testimonies from Queensland survivors who tell their stories about life before, during and after the Holocaust. The museum also pays tribute to those Righteous Among the Nations who saved Jewish lives.

Jason Steinberg, chairman of the Queensland Holocaust Museum and Education Centre (QHMEC), said the museum would not have been possible without the support of the Queensland government, from which it received \$3.5 million, as well as \$500,000 from Brisbane City Council. The federal government has also made a commitment of \$3.5 million, and the Catholic Archdiocese of Brisbane is providing the space for the museum.

"We all have a huge responsibility to keep the memory of the Holocaust alive so that the atrocities are never forgotten. Our multifaceted and engaging museum tells the story of the Holocaust in a way that it has never been told – through the voices, stories and artefacts provided by Queensland survivors," Steinberg, who is also president of the Queensland Jewish Board of Deputies, said.

"Our education programs will resonate strongly with school students and encourage tolerance and strategies to stand up against hate of any kind."

Stories include that of Eva Klug who survived two concentration camps, fought in the resistance and convinced a Russian Commandant to give her a truck and driver so she could save more than 200 dying people and get them to a hospital in Prague. In 1947, Eva married fellow survivor, Bert Klug, before the couple migrated to Australia in 1948.

John and Ada Lipski, who were married in the Lodz Ghetto are also featured. The pair were separated when they were sent to death camps, finding each other by chance after the war. They arrived in Brisbane in 1950, becoming integral members of the Jewish community.

Along with the physical museum in Brisbane, the QHMEC has created a mobile museum that will tour regional Queensland and a digital museum that will be relevant internationally.

'I am alive because of upstanders':

Holocaust survivors share stories

at revamped museum

Holocaust survivor **Peter Gaspar** believes he is alive today because of his father's Christian friends, domestic staff and colleagues, who hid the Jewish family after the Nazis occupied Bratislava in what is now Slovakia.

"We hid in people's homes for 2½ years in their cellars and attics and roof cavities and in their cupboards and garden sheds," said Gaspar, 86, who immigrated to Australia with his parents in 1949.

"In 2006, I took my wife, two children and a grandchild to see these people because I wanted them to see who they owe their life to."

Gaspar is part of an education program in which Holocaust survivors speak to students at the Melbourne Holocaust Museum in Elsternwick.

The museum, formerly known as the Jewish Holocaust Centre, was founded by Melbourne Holocaust survivors in 1984 seeking to combat antisemitism, racism and prejudice in the community.

The museum closed in 2020 for a major redevelopment by Kerstin Thompson Architects and will reopen to the public in October.

Gaspar said his focus was not on the horror of the Holocaust, but the importance of standing up to prejudice.

"The people who stood up were upstanders instead of being bystanders," Gaspar said.

"The Holocaust didn't start with gas chambers and murders and executions. It started with stereotyping, prejudice, discrimination, hate speech; and once people were conditioned to hate, then came the very systematic, industrially organised murder."

The redeveloped museum will include a dedicated exhibition called Hidden for children aged 10 to 14. It tells the stories of seven Melbourne child survivors who were concealed during World War II.

The permanent display – Everybody had a name – features multimedia testimonies from people who were forced to live in ghettos or concentration camps.

The diary of Trude Leipnik, who was imprisoned at the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp in northern Germany, is exhibited along with an animation depicting a traumatic 10-day journey from one camp to another that she described in her journal.

"We've brought it to life through multimedia, so it makes it more accessible for a visitor to understand," museum chief executive Jayne Josem said.

"It tells of how one woman and her two children were dehumanised and transported from one place to another without any choice or agency."

Also on display is a haunting sketch of an emaciated prisoner by Australian war artist Lieutenant Alan Moore, who was embedded with the British Army at the liberation of Bergen-Belsen.

"Alan Moore's drawing of this woman also includes this ghostly image, which if you look hard enough looks like how this woman could have been before all these terrible atrocities," said Dr Anna Hirsh, the museum's manager of collections. "Sadly, she died a few hours after he drew her."


Kerstin Thompson Architects included mirrors and views of the outside world – the sky, clouds and rooftops – in its design to provide relief for those affected by the museum's harrowing content.

"Stephen Jolson, who did the fit-out for the memorial space which has a view of the sky, said his grandfather, a Holocaust survivor, told him how important the sky was in concentration camps as a connection to nature and to life," project lead Anne-Claire Deville said.

The museum also features glass bricks, a reference to Kristallnacht – the Night of Broken Glass – when the windows of Jewish-owned shops and synagogues were smashed throughout Germany in November 1938.

Exhausted after years of hiding, Gaspar's parents decided to turn themselves into Nazi authorities in the winter of 1944.

Gaspar's father was forced to work as a slave labourer in the Sachsenhausen concentration camp in northern Germany, while Gaspar and his mother were sent to Terezin, also known as Theresienstadt, a camp in what was then Czechoslovakia.

However, the war ended five months later and they all survived – something Gaspar believes would not have occurred without the families who hid them for so long.

Forty members of Gaspar's extended family, who were arrested in June 1942 and deported to Auschwitz, were killed. Gaspar said it was stimulating and rewarding to speak to students. "They ask questions I never imagined they would ask. A student asked me, 'Have you lost your faith as a result of the Holocaust?' I had to think for a moment and had to answer, 'No, I haven't, because I didn't have any faith.' We were Jewish but totally nonobservant."

After education programs at the museum, students are asked to write what was memorable about their visit.

"They say, 'I will remember to be an upstander', I will remember not to have prejudice'," Gaspar said.

"It's making an impression on students. That is the purpose of the museum – to educate against hate."

Since 2014, the B'nai B'rith and JNF Jewish Changemaker Awards have been showcasing the Australian Jewish community's young achievers.

The awards have three categories: the Joshua Levi Young Professional Award, the Young Adult Volunteer Award and the Youth Volunteer Award. All nominee submissions are evaluated by a panel of esteemed judges. In addition to the prestige of being coined one of the top 36 Australian Changemakers under the age of 36, the winner of each category receives prize money.

The AJN recognises the importance of nurturing and supporting young leaders, and has partnered with B'nai B'rith and JNF to increase the coverage and reach of the initiative.

"This is an excellent platform for our community to showcase our young professionals and volunteers, and for our young entrepreneurs to introduce their businesses to the world," national editor Gareth Narunsky said.

"It is especially meaningful to have an award named after Joshua Levi, who was a much-loved colleague and friend

to all at The AJN."

Changemaker and community stalwart Shayna Slotar said, "We as young adults are the future of the Australian Jewish community.

"My Jewish identity is a very strong part of who I am, and volunteering in the community deepens my connection to it and allows me to grow as a Jewish community member," she said.

"Growing up in a small community like Perth, I relished the opportunity to use my event management skills to help the broader Jewish community engage with its young adults.

"As a result of my ongoing voluntary work, I have ... had the opportunity to go overseas to discuss the future of our global community with leaders from around the world."

Slotar said the best piece of advice she received – which kickstarted her volunteering journey – was **"just to** say yes".

"And now as an ambassador for the Changemaker Awards, I encourage everyone else to just say 'yes', because you never know what amazing experiences you'll have along the way and how proud you will feel representing your Jewish community.

"Last year was the first year we introduced 36 under 36 in memory of Joshua Levi z"l, and I truly hope the new format will provide a more prestigious platform to honour the amazing Changemakers in our community."

ASK THE RABBI

Questioning The Meaning Of Life

Rabbi Raymond Apple was for many years Australia's highest profile rabbi and the leading spokesman on Judaism. After serving congregations in London, Rabbi Apple was chief minister of the Great Synagogue, Sydney, for 32 years. He also held many public roles, particularly in the fields of chaplaincy, interfaith dialogue and Freemasonry, and is the recipient of several national and civic honours. Now retired, he lives in Jerusalem and blogs at **www.oztorah.com**

Why are rabbis often so hesitant in answering difficult theological questions, particularly about the meaning of life?

Human beings have agonised over the really hard questions from time immemorial...

What is the nature of God? What does it mean to be created **"in the image of God"?** Does man really have free will? Why do the righteous suffer? What is the meaning of life? What happens after we are dead?

In Hebrew these are called **"she'elot hanetzach"** – "eternal questions". From at least as early as the time of the ancient Greek philosophers, thinkers have sought final, definitive answers to these questions.

But they were not successful; otherwise, the human mind would not have continued to address these issues. We can find partial answers, approaches to an answer, but the last word continues to elude us – because, as it has been said, eternal questions are by definition **"questions that cannot be solved short of eternity".**

"Eternity" may be shorthand for God. We cannot hope to possess the Divine perspective of eternity, but it is axiomatic that God does.

Does this then imply, as the Yiddish phrase puts it, that **"m'darf nicht fregen"** - "one dare not ask?"

Not at all. We feel the problems, they will not let us go, we have to ask. We have to keep chipping away and understanding at least a little, if not everything.

Where rabbis are useful in this enterprise is as resource personnel, able to direct people to the test material and to acquaint them with the approaches that have been tried over the ages, even though the final word is still elusive.





The Courage to Care Program (C2C) aims to promote social harmony and reduce prejudice by inspiring/empowering children and adults to be UPSTANDERS rather than bystanders, when they witness discrimination. C2C uses stories of rescue during the Holocaust to plant the seeds of awareness, understanding and empathy for others.

After the June/July school holidays, our team eagerly returned to classrooms to share our program with Queensland school students. We were very pleased to host survivor Judy Bahar from Sydney for our first week back. After a productive three sessions at Brigidine College on 17th July, Dean of Teaching & Learning Nidean Dickson provided wonderful feedback about our team and program:

On behalf of the College, thank you to the Courage to Care Team for their generosity and incredible wisdom, passion and humanity that they gave to us today. Ngaire, Phillip, Leah and of course Judy, will be people our students will remember in the many years to come. As a teacher, I was reminded of the purpose behind the work I am doing and it is through the vulnerability of people like Judy and the heart of the Courage to Care Team, that allows the pulse of humanitarian education to continue. I cannot thank you enough for the opportunity to have you all with us today. This life is precious, and we are so privileged to be in the presence of wonderful people doing extraordinary things.

Nidean is a 2020 graduate of the Gandel Holocaust Studies Program at Yad Vashem, and upon her return established 'Suspend Judgement' at Brigidine College – a program designed to support extension learning about the Holocaust for students in Years 10-12. The 155 Year 10 and 'Suspend Judgement' students attending the C2C sessions enthusiastically engaged with the content and during workshop facilitations.

We were welcomed once again to Parklands Christian College on 18th July where our team presented to 58 Year 9 students. The students were well-prepared and had background knowledge of the content as they have been learning about the Holocaust and studying the novel 'The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas'. Upon reflection, students commented "I am going to be a nicer person" and "I am going to give people more compliments."

We completed our week with two days at Stuartholme School on 20th and 21st July, presenting to 113 Year 10 students. The students' engagement was excellent and during one workshop facilitation a student remarked that she "felt the responsibility to share Judy's story with her family and others", while another commented that "One small action can lead to bigger changes".

We thank Judy for travelling to Brisbane to share her testimony for the week, and to our team of incredible volunteers for their dedication in sharing our program and empowering Queensland school students to make a difference in their world.

We are always keen for more committed and passionate people to join our team of dedicated volunteers. Sixteen selected young adults from across Australia recently returned from a JNFuture Leadership Delegation to Israel in honour of her75th birthday. The delegation travelled across Israel to grasp firsthand the country's landscape and communities, achievements and challenges.

From fruit picking in the desert, to startup innovations and Zionist advocacy, participants experienced Israel through a JNF lens. They visited JNF projects across the country, interacted with a variety of beneficiaries and shared a diverse range of experiences and speakers. HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE 86TH HEBREW UNIVERSITY BOARD OF GOVERNORS' MEETING IN JERUSALEM

The 86th Hebrew University of Jerusalem Board of Governors' (BOG) meeting took place mid-June in Jerusalem. It was a fun-filled and informative 4 days filled with formal and informal gatherings, fascinating lectures, moving ceremonies, and entertaining events.

The BOG is not only a time for the university to conduct important business, but it also serves as a meeting place where board members, dedicated partners, and philanthropic supporters from around the world gather to reconnect with old friends and meet new ones.

With this year's theme of Sustainable Planet, the 2023 BOG focused on the Hebrew University's (HU) commitment to a sustainable university and spotlighted the many HU research breakthroughs that are helping to build a more sustainable future. Highlights included Sunday's trip to the Robert H. Smith Faculty of Agriculture, Food, and Environment on the university's Rehovot campus, which included a visit to HUJI Market, where BOG attendees were able to enjoy some of the ways the Smith Faculty is helping Israel and the world grow tasty, nourishing, and sustainable food. The day's presentation of the President's Report highlighted the university's academic achievements and featured a delicious, sustainability-themed lunch for attendees. The day concluded with a festive cocktail reception where partygoers enjoyed a range of tempting morsels that were developed, grown, and harvested at Smith Faculty facilities.

Also featured was a celebration that honoured HU Benefactors, as well as ceremonies where honorary fellowships and doctorates were conferred. The Australian Friends were proud that our own Professor Leon Mann AO from Melbourne was awarded an Honorary Doctorate for his many years of dedicated

commitment to the Hebrew University and for his myriad of achievements to society in so many areas both in Australia and in Israel.

That evening, the Australian Friends hosted a supper in honour of Professor Mann and the Australians who had travelled to Israel for the BOG.

HU honoured the generosity of its many friends through Wall of Life, Legacy Tree, and Wall of Founders dedications. Australian benefactor, the late Deborah Joselson of Victoria had her name inscribed on the Wall of Life in recognition of her generous bequest to the HU.

After a morning of beautiful and moving ceremonies on the Mt. Scopus campus, BOG attendees travelled to the Edmond J. Safra Campus to witness the presentation of this year's highly competitive Asper Prize startup award to Avertto, a startup in the health field. Finally, the BOG closing ceremony was held that evening on the Safra Campus in the presence of the President of the State of Israel, Isaac Herzog and his wife Michal. The President participated in the laying of the cornerstone for the new Einstein House - a remarkable structure scheduled to open in 2025 that will share Einstein's legacy and achievements with the world. The distinctive building, designed by the world-renowned architect Daniel Libeskind, will highlight the impact of Einstein's discoveries, his involvement in humanitarian and civil rights issues, as well as his deep commitment to Hebrew University, the State of Israel, and the global Jewish community.



The Einstein House will house exhibits of the legacy, work, and research of Nobel laureate Albert Einstein, one of the founders of the Hebrew University, who bequeathed all his writings and intellectual property to it. The House will serve as a centre for scientific and technological education and employ modern display techniques, scientific demonstrations, and original documents to showcase Einstein's immense contribution to science.
