Haifa transforms car park into underground hospital as possibility of northern Israel attack looms

BY MATTHEW DORAN, BASEL HINDELEH, GEOFF KEMP AND SHIRA HADAS NAKAR IN HAIFA Three floors underground, out of the stifling heat, Professor Yael Shachor-Meyouhas wants to make one thing crystal clear.

"We didn't convert a parking lot into a fortified hospital," she explained.

"We built a fortified hospital, which we use as a parking lot."

It may seem like an odd point to make, but it reflects the nature of this hospital ward in the northern Israeli city of Haifa. Professor Shachor-Meyouhas is in charge of a sprawling subterranean complex, stretching underneath the Rambam Medical Centre.

She proudly declares it's the biggest underground hospital in the world.

"During war, it can take us up to 72 hours to prepare," she says. But three days is too long in the current climate.

The ward is ready now, and has been since the beginning of the Israel Gaza war on October 7.

Hospital staff have been running drills, practising moving patients from Rambam's above ground complex into the underground safe haven — a process which can take six to seven hours. Row upon row of 1,200 empty beds lie in wait for a feared influx where more than 2,200 patients can be treated. At full capacity the space can fit 5,000 people including all the staff and their families.

Reminders of its life as a car park are still there — each space numbered twice — as a place to leave a vehicle and a number corresponding to a bed.

But it is much cleaner than a car park would be. Almost pristine.

The ward can take in all of the patients currently in the aboveground Rambam Hospital, and provide refuge for some from the city's other medical facilities — as well as treat anyone injured if the city comes under attack.

Why Haifa built this hospital

The idea for an underground hospital came in 2006, after Haifa came under attack during the second Lebanon war.

Professor Shachor-Meyouhas gave birth to her third son in the basement of an older Rambam building where existing underground surgical suites were turned into makeshift delivery rooms.

"I felt safe at that time, yes, because we were underground, but this fortified hospital is much more than just a safe place," she said.

It even has a dedicated control room with a large screen where doctors can at a glance see information about patients, beds and operating rooms, as well as blood, oxygen, water and fuel reserves.

The state of the art facility is a stark contrast to the conditions faced by medics in Gaza, with hospitals destroyed, damaged, or overrun and barely functional.

The horrors of war are not lost on Professor Shachor-Meyouhas, a practising paediatrician as well as part of the hospital's executive.

"I think that all doctors — our purpose is to treat patients," she said after a brief pause.

"We all hope that, of course, there will be peace, and we'll come to treat everyone."

A city-wide view from a bunker

Haifa may well be attacked again.

Hezbollah's leader Hassan Nasrallah said as much in a televised speech a couple of weeks ago, where he promised retribution for Israel's assassination of one of his senior commanders in Lebanon's capital, Beirut.

The picturesque port city of Haifa is only about 30 kilometres away from the Lebanese border and almost 300,000 people call it home — more than 1 million live in the broader region.

There have been plans for years to rehabilitate the heavy industrial site and the surrounding area, which has a long history of storing chemicals and fertilisers.

The government ordered the stores should be emptied, with Hezbollah releasing what they describe as footage from surveillance drones of key sites in Haifa.

"Everything could be a target," Yair Zilberman, the emergency director for Haifa's municipality, told the ABC. "In 2006, almost 100 rockets hit the ground in Haifa.

"And we had some casualties, of course and we think that it will be the same, but more rockets this time."

His team have been racing around the city, building more bomb shelters and improving those already scattered across Haifa increasing capacity threefold.

The refuges can now be remotely unlocked at the push of a button from the Haifa Municipality's own underground bunker, across town from the hospital.

"We are ready, always — if I have two months more [to prepare], I could be more ready," he quipped.

Every day the council staff meet in a war room, inside the warren-like bomb shelter behind thick metal doors.

Joining them are the Israeli Defense Force, the local police and fire brigade, port and airport authorities and other essential services to coordinate their work, with live camera feeds of the Haifa metro area beamed into their control centre.

"Everyone is worried, even me — however, someone needs to be relaxed and to run the situation," Mr Zilberman said.

'There's no reason why wars should be the norm'

Retired Australian-Israeli university professor Paul Feigin lives in an apartment building in the leafy suburb of Ahuza.

Originally from Melbourne, via the Australian National University in Canberra, he has lived in Haifa with his wife for 48 years.

They have raised three daughters and welcomed nine grandchildren — but despite loving Haifa, he is starting to feel like completing the fifth decade in the city could be a stretch.

"Truth is, until this last war started, we never thought of leaving," Mr Feigin said.

"We have three children here, we have nine grandchildren here, we're here.

"But in the last few months, if the government is going to keep changing the rules and becoming less democratic and a more autocratic regime, I don't think there's a great future."

He said people living in the area should not have to "get used" to living with the threat

of war, suggesting the Israeli government should change tack.

"I think that the politicians should work out a way to look into the future a little further than their noses and their immediate needs," he said.

"And we're in a situation where this could be a wonderful place to live.

"There's no reason why wars should be the norm."

But he acknowledges the reality of the situation.

"It worries us to the extent that when we moved to this apartment, we made sure that it had a safe room, and now, when the war started 10 months ago, we actually made sure that we had supplies and water in there.

"So we're being careful but it hasn't really affected our day to day lives. We're really still travelling and still going to my work."

He says while most people are trying to keep up a normal life things feel a bit different.

"[There's] less people walking on the beach the last few months than usual, and there's less traffic around too. So I think there are, there are people who are holding back, who are not doing everything."

'They are not running away'

Back in the Haifa Municipality bunker, a team of staff are at work answering phone calls from concerned residents.

"There's no panic, but people are concerned," Tal Sabino, the call centre's manager said. "They call us to get information about what they need to do, where do they need to go in case of alarm, what kind of equipment do they need, and we give them all the information."

The phones are not ringing off the hook just yet, but the team are expecting that to change if the situation deteriorates.

Mattresses are piled up, in readiness for pulling all-night shifts.

The team of 15 staff will swell to more than 100, he said.

"We do not underestimate the threat, that's why we're preparing constantly," Mr Sabino said.

"But at the same time, we're determined.

"The people here, they call this place home, they are not running away."

The Great Synagogue's innovative program is now available for women across the broader Sydney community.

The popular bat mitzvah program for adults run by the Great Synagogue is now being offered across the Sydney community. *"Embracing Bat Mitzvah: Sisterhood and Tradition"*, for adults who missed the opportunity when younger, is attracting women across generations and religious affiliations, and is now open to non-members.

Specifically designed for adult women, the 12-week program, which starts on September 1, features a range of experienced educators offering Sunday morning classes covering topics such as spirituality, mitzvahs, prophetesses and famous Jewish women, culminating with the group's bat mitzvah in December.

Coinciding with The Great Synagogue's 'Women Of Worth' (WOW) Weekend in 2019, and with the approval and encouragement of Chief Minister Rabbi Ben Elton, the initiative was launched by the congregation's then Vice President Caroline Lewis.

"Call me selfish, but I'd never had a bat mitzvah and I really wanted to have one," Lewis told The Jewish Independent.

"I wanted to know the feeling of walking up on to the bimah, surrounded by friends and family, and to experience the role of a woman in a Shule service."

It didn't take long to fill the spots when the program was launched as *"12 Over 12"* in 2019, Lewis said, as many women had been overlooked for their bat mitzvah.

"When they were 12 it wasn't deemed fashionable for girls to have a bat mitzvah, or it was simply seen as an opportunity only for a boy's role. These 12 women wanted to find a way to experience it." Designing the format required an educator. Jacki Gluck facilitated a program that took place every Sunday over six weeks.

"Some of my '12 over 12' peers also wanted to honour their parents or loved ones, many lost in the Holocaust," says Lewis, "while others in the group, including two women who had completed conversions to Judaism, saw a bat mitzvah as their chance to engage in a deeply meaningful religious experience."

For Lewis, the experience drew on her mother, Alice Hubbers, who was on the Kindertransport at age 13. In 1938 Hubbers witnessed Hitler enter Vienna, and later Kristallnacht, before escaping the Nazi invasion.

"She rarely celebrated birthdays, and a bat mitzvah was definitely not on the cards. When I thought about what she was doing at 12, I wanted to stand up there for her, and for all the women during that era who weren't able to celebrate their childhood – let alone participate in a milestone like this."

Inspired by her daughter's actions, Hubbers took the opportunity to celebrate her own bat mitzvah with the following cohort.

However, as the program went into hiatus during lockdowns, the next intake was for the December 2023 ceremony. Hubbers was 98 by then, the most senior of any group. She turns 100 in January.

Hubbers says the reason she wanted to have one was **"to catch up on doing more things** that connect me with my Jewish religion and heritage".

The women found many reasons for marking their bat mitzvahs. *"12 over 12 sounded so cool!"* enthused Diane Alperstein, another member of the 2023 who was in her seventies when she participated. "It was a revelation; I realised I was being offered the opportunity to fill a gap in my life, strongly connected to my Jewish heritage. The experience was, I'm not exaggerating when I say, electric.

"On the first day that we met, everyone was beaming; anticipation and eagerness at the learning before us. It was a powerful and emotional experience... [that] we could relate to more deeply as adults."

This experience changed significantly following October 7. "It gave us a platform to discuss the bravery of the Israeli women. We could also relate this to the significance of our role in the continuing survival of the Jewish people." "I could see what impact [of the bar mitzvah ceremony] had on my daughter and granddaughters – in fact one of my grandchildren thinks you should only have your bat mitzvah when you're over 70!

"It was an incredible experience ... I feel better for it! Somehow, I feel more Jewish than I did before! I'm very happy I did it."

This year's program is being run by the Chair of Great Women, Sharon Schach. "The women who do this class become very close, it [becomes] a sisterhood. They're sharing something very, very special," Schach says.

"One person who registered asked me: 'I don't know any Hebrew – can I still do this?' Absolutely. Of course! All the classes are conducted in English, so knowledge of Hebrew is not a requirement."

"Another asked: 'I'm not a shule-goer, I'm not religious but I still want to do it.' Schach assured her, stating: 'That's fine. We're not making you do anything. Not become religious nor [Shabbat] observant. Not requiring that you eat Kosher food.'

"[The program aims] to help you learn about your Jewish background; to embrace you into the Jewish community in whatever format you want."

Alperstein concludes: "It comes with the benefit of making friends, in your shule or wider community. Enrolling in the bar mitzvah program will exceed your expectations."

Time for Palestinians to stop fetishising victimhood stories

There is an excellent YouTube video of an interview with the coruscatingly brilliant Yuval Noah Harari in which he asserts his belief that wars and conflicts – including, he says, the conflict currently "tearing apart" his region – are not about land or territory but about "stories".

The Israeli historian and philosopher who took the world by storm with his 2011 book, "Sapiens," notes that "objectively" there is "no shortage of land" between "the Mediterranean and the Jordan River" and also that Russia's invasion of Ukraine was not due to Russia suffering "any shortage of territory." Thus, asserts Harari, wars happen because of "the stories people tell themselves;" people fight over "the stories in their minds."

Personally, I think Harari has chosen to brush aside the appeal of nationalism and to ignore the "conquerors" from the Greeks, Romans, Mongols and Ottomans to Adolf Hitler, whose declared casus belli was lebensraum (living space). But I felt that he may have a point about the toxicity of "stories" and their impactparticularly in the Israel-Palestine conflict - after reading an interview given by Bella, one of the two Hadid supermodel sisters. Like sister Gigi, Bella is invariably styled as "Palestinian." Both are vocal supporters of Palestinians and Gigi has made some strikingly anti-Israel comments.

In the interview, with online magazine The Cut, Bella – who was recently embroiled in a row over an Adidas sneaker advertisement – spoke about her family's "personal history" of "displacement" from Palestine. The phrase "personal history" suggested Prof Harari's thesis has validity, since her father who describes himself as "a Palestinian refugee" is the billionaire, Bel Air real-estate developer Mohamed Hadid.

As is clear from an interview he gave to another US magazine, he was in a refugee camp in Syria for a very brief period before spending his childhood in – one assumes from his comments, safety and relative comfort – in homes in Syria, Lebanon and Tunisia, before arriving in 1964 in the USA where he built his megasuccessful business.

So, "refugee" is a tad disingenuous even if technically true according to, say, UNRWA. I am not denying Mr Hadid the right to claim to be "a refugee" nor saying he should not perceive himself as "a refugee" if he wishes to do so, nor am I disputing that his family had roots in Palestine - as, of course do many Jews, whose roots often go much deeper. Nor am I even disputing his right to claim that his family did not leave Palestine voluntarily. But I am suggesting that the fetishising of that aspect of his early life and the overt "yearning" to "return" gives credence to Prof Harari's thesis in the context of the Israel-Palestine conflict because irrespective of how much truth there is in that version, it is the story Mr Hadid has been told; it is the story he tells himself and it is also the story his

American-born daughter tells herself, tells interviewers and tells the whole world.

It is the story millions of Palestinians – regardless of wealth, geographical location or the actual circumstances of their departure – tell themselves. And, of course, tell a receptive world because Palestinians deploy their "refugee" status and their "stories" in a way that is designed to continue to fuel a grievance. And the constant repitition has led to that grievance growingd and solidifying into something toxic – in rougly the same way that grit in an oyster ultimately grows into a pearl.

While I understand the pain of "displacement" – how could a Jew whose ancestors suffered "displacement" in almost every generation, not understand it – I see only one reason for the Palestinians to collectively fetishise and nurture their "story" of "displacement" across so many generations. And that is to "justify" terrorism (or so-called resistance). And, of course, to allow other power-blocs and nations to weaponise it and exploit it on their behalf (and not, of course for the benefit of the Palestinian people, but in pursuit of their own geopolitical ambitions).


And we know there is another way, because the 900,000 Jews who were also "displaced" or "expelled" by Arab countries in 1948 – including between 17,000 and 40,000 made refugees from Gaza, the West Bank and East Jerusalem – simply got on with their lives without nurturing their sorrow or fetishising the pain they felt at being displaced, stripped of their wealth or in some cases seeing their families brutally butchered.

Perhaps we should also note that the "pain" for the Palestinian Arabs could have been mitigated – or avoided altogether –by staying in the new state of Israel in 1948 (as 150,000 Palestinian Arabs did in defiance of their leaders), or settling in one of the 20-plus Islamic states in the region. But no, unlike the Jews from Arab lands, the Palestinians carried on politicising and amplifying their "grief" by telling mournful (and possibly exaggerated) stories of "expulsions" to embellish a narrative of lies, half-truths and myths. And whether they are wealthy citizens of other countries or the Palestinians who stayed in Gaza or the West Bank, their "stories" are used to incite and radicalise; to help recruit suicide bombers and raise funds to underwrite terrorism.

Undeniably, we Jews tell ourselves "stories" too, but the key points of the Jewish narrative are rooted in objective reality. As well as ancient sources which indicate a Jewish presence in this land from Bible times onward (cf Old and New Testaments, the Quran and archaeological finds), land records, population censuses, birth certificates, passports and multiple authoritative contemporaneous sources prove a continuous Jewish presence in the ancestral Jewish homeland. Also, our "stories" are not used to incite, radicalise, recruit suicide bombers or fund terror

The Palestinians, however, continue to tell themselves (and their children and grandchildren) "stories" (despite the often tenuous link the stories have to reality) while those who exploit and weaponise their "pain" keep on exploiting and weaponising it.

So if – as the eminent "Sapiens" author believes – people really do go to war over the "stories they tell themselves" perhaps it is time for sentient, well-meaning Palestinians to stop telling "stories" that will be used to justify murder and terrorism, to fuel Jew-hate and ultimately to harm their own people.



'My brother saved my life': 104-year-old Warsaw Ghetto survivor remembers his hero


When you turn 104,

it makes sense to have a big birthday party.

Berysz Aurbach, of Caulfield, had a suitably large black forest cake with *"Happy 104th Birthday"* inscribed on it in Hebrew.

Family and friends visited all day on Sunday. There were enough sponge cakes, biscuits and pastries to shock a cardiologist.

Guests toasted Aurbach, whose actual birthday was Saturday, with whisky and said *"I'chaim"* (to life). There was much to be thankful for: Aurbach has three children, four grandchildren and a lovely home.



Now, as always, Aurbach thinks of his late brother, Mordechai, who he says saved his life, many times.

Their father, oldest brother Leibl, a sisterin-law and her two children died during the uprising. Aurbach, Mordechai and Mordechai's girlfriend watched the fires from an apartment outside the ghetto.

More than 80 years ago, he survived the Warsaw Ghetto, in Nazi-occupied Poland. Some 90,000 Jews in the ghetto died of starvation and disease. More than 300,000 were shot or killed in extermination camps.

"You must understand, I felt terrible," he said. "I still see the fire, in my eyes." Shortly before the ghetto uprising, Mordechai, part of the anti-Nazi underground resistance movement, gave Aurbach a fake ID and organised a Polish police uniform, which Aurbach wore to slip out of the ghetto, unnoticed.

Aurbach spent the rest of the war in safe houses run by the underground.

But Mordechai and his girlfriend, who had been posing as gentiles, were dobbed in to the Gestapo. Mordechai was shot dead and his girlfriend was shot in the leg and later died.

"Mordechai saved my life. Of course, he is my hero," Aurbach says.

If not for Mordechai, *"either one or the other, I would have burned in the [ghetto] fire or burned in the ovens [in concentration camps].*

"Of course, I often think of him now. For much of my life, I thought of him, wherever I was."

In the ghetto, Aurbach, whose mother had died of illness when he was a baby, survived round-ups of Jews, in which Nazis chose those to be deported to camps and those allowed to stay.

If someone strayed out of formation or the guards didn't like their face, or for fun, they would *"shoot a few people"*. While hiding in Warsaw and elsewhere after the ghetto, Aurbach was in constant fear.



"If the Germans had found me, they would have shot me on the spot. Like my brother."

Just one sibling, Esther, out of the five he grew up with in Biala Podlaska, eastern Poland, survived the Holocaust.

Aurbach migrated to Melbourne in 1947 and ran a successful knitting business. In 1955, he met his wife, Tova, in Israel. Tova died of cancer 12 years ago.

Relatives say Aurbach is resilient and loves life. He goes to synagogue, reads books and goes shopping.

"He believes himself to be much younger than 104," says granddaughter Dani Jackson.

His faith is important.

"You need to hold on to something. You can't be empty altogether,"

Aurbach says.
